

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

The fall season definitely reminds us that nature is constantly moving, transforming and renewing. Just as nature is transforming, so we too. However, we can change for the better not only physically but also spiritually. So, this month I would like to reflect on our spiritual transformation since the book of the prophets. Accordingly, having an individual that is aiming for personal betterment, we are going to archive real progress in our society.

Throughout ancient times—consisting of many centuries—the prophets were a great source of social morality, justice, and peace. In their teachings, we can find a solid doctrine of transformation, not just in a social way, but also in a personal way. From ancient times, up to and including now, people have longed to have a better society and be better citizens. Of course, many communities and individuals have indeed reached these admirable goals, yet many others have not. Whether it is an ancient or modern society, many people have struggled with psychological issues, have tried to fight against vices, and have sought desperately to change their negative behaviors. These people want to change their life—if not their entire life, at least some parts of it. As a solution, modern-day thinking recommends turning toward medicine (for pharmaceuticals), neuroscience (for brain mapping), genetics (for DNA analysis), psychology (for cognitive therapy), Transcendental Meditation (for relaxation techniques), etc. Rarely does contemporary society turn to religion for answers and aid.

As a matter of fact, several prophets talked about personal transformation. Consider the words of Ezekiel 36, "I will give you a new heart, and a new spirit I will put within. . . I will give you a heart of flesh." This promise clearly reflects the desire of God to transform the person. Ezekiel uses the adjective new to indicate a replacement, something recent, something fresh, or something not contaminated. His crucial point is clear: God is always seeking to renew man. All of mankind has to be aware that the personal transformation being sought can be accomplished only by God. Another clear example is found in Jeremiah 18, "I went down to the potter's house and there he was. . . Whenever the vessel of clay he was making turned out badly in his hand, he tried again, making another vessel...Can I not do to you. . . as this potter has done?" This passage without question asserts that God can re-create us according to His will. We must always remember that the purpose of God's will for us is to have life, to be truly happy, and to have everlasting life. Without question, we can be the person that God wants us to be if we live according to His will. Interestingly, the prophet Isaiah uses the same imagery as Ezekiel. In Chapter 64, Isaiah says, "Yet, Lord, you are our father; we are the clay and you our potter: we are all the work of your hand." These words are said with conviction. Isaiah is very aware and strongly trusts, that we can be transformed only by God. From the perspective of this passage, modern society would be wise to acknowledge that God is our creator and that He has the power to re-create us. Therefore, God is the one who has the solution to our personal problems. Accordingly, if we wish to be a complete and fully-functioning person, we should turn towards God.

It is quite obvious that the prophets' messages do not align with the thinking of today. These days, we are told that we are just the result of genetics, of cultural heritage, or the environment. We are like an organism that only responds to external stimuli without any capacity for decision-making. This way of thinking is wrong, of course. We are not just a biological organism. We are a person comprised of a body, soul, and spirit. As the prophets remind us, we owe our existence to God and only He is able to re-create us because of His vast love for us.

In particular, the prophet Hosea describes the pure tenderness of God's love for His people. In Chapter 11 Hosea says, *"I drew them (His people) with human cords, with bands of love; I fostered them like those who raise an infant to their cheeks; I bent down to feed them."* Although the reference here is to a group of people as a whole, we can interpret those words in a personal way. God is talking to us—in an individual way. Thus, we can understand how greatly God seeks our well-being, and how much He is willing to heal all our wounds so that we can be restored to a full life. God is the one who can restore, renew, and re-create.

To clarify, I am not saying that scientific disciplines are not useful. What I am saying is that modern society seems to have forgotten that God plays a crucial role in our lives. Indeed, the sciences are very useful, and they empower us to achieve a productive life. However, we should consider the wise advice of the prophets: *"I know well the plan I have in mind for you—oracle of the Lord—plan for your welfare and not for woe, so as to give you a future of hope"* (Jer 29:11). In short, we should trust in God whose love is sure to transform us.

Brethren, I wish you the best throughout all your duties and activities in this month of November, and I repeat my thanks to all of you. Likewise, I can assure you of my prayers for the success of all your many projects and the well-being of your families.

- All visitor spaces in the York St. Parking lot.





The continuation of the *We are IC* capital campaign is vital to completing the renovation of the largest worship space at Immaculate Conception Parish. It will also restore and highlight the space as the Sacred Heart Chapel. The success of raising the remaining **\$1.3 million** is in our hands. We invite you to preserve the memory of your loved ones with a memorial gift towards our Sacred Heart Chapel. If the dollars needed are received through pledges with adequate cash on hand, the final work on the Chapel will begin in May 2020.




Exterior Stained Glass Panels

In the summer of 2019, new doors were installed on the exterior of the entire building. In order to identify entrance to Sacred Heart Chapel, stained glass panels will be installed in the exterior transoms of all three sets of doors. All who pass by the building while on Arthur Street will be blessed to recognize the special entrances to our Sacred Heart Chapel. There are 8 panels of glass available.

Narthex Upgrades

Upon entering Sacred Heart Chapel, you come into the narthex. The functions of this area are many as it is a very important part of the space. Before you enter the nave, the main worship area, the narthex is above all meant for hospitality. It is here that parishioners can spend time greeting with one another before and after Mass. It is in this area that many of our parish groups share their information with parishioners. The narthex as it stands today was originally intended to be more of a lobby for the upstairs gymnasium. We plan to make the narthex slightly larger by removing the two planters. It is our hope that the narthex will become more useful. New flooring and lighting will enhance this area to help make it a place that speaks of more hospitality. The narthex will then exist with a better sense of transition into the main body of the chapel, the nave.

Etched Glass Door Panels

Between the narthex and the nave in the center of the Sacred Heart Chapel, there will be four wood doors that will have glass panels within them. These beautiful pieces of etched glass will continue the sense of welcome as you enter the main part of the chapel. The beautiful panels of glass will be etched with both religious symbols and other design elements. They will provide a beautiful threshold into the main area.

Sound System

The importance of amplifying sound is of great value for all who will use the renovated chapel. A new sound system will make it possible to help you to be able to better hear the priests, deacons, readers, and musicians.



Stations of the Cross

The way of the cross takes us on the path that Jesus traveled that brought us eternal life. The new Stations of the Cross will be made out of natural materials that will relate to the other services within the chapel. One of these memorials will give you the opportunity to remember the life of a loved one, especially as it relates to the life of Christ. Consider someone from your family being amongst those who travel with Christ on His final journey. The stations afford us the beautiful opportunity to connect our many pains and sufferings with the great pain that He endured for us.

Stained Glass Windows

A number of the new stained glass windows have already been memorialized. A symbol for each of the saints will be next to their picture. Many of the saints being remembered are either from our country or are newly canonized. A list of possible saints is provided. However, a family can also possibly choose a saint of their choice. A patron saint of a deceased loved one would be a lasting memorial in their honor. Possible saints for future windows include St. John XXIII, St. Isaac Jogues, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton, St. John Neuman, St. Francis Xavier Cabrini, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, St. Damien of Molokai, and St. Katherine Drexel.
