Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

The month of October brings a time of transition from one season to the next. Our long and unusual summer days will soon be a fond memory as we will be embracing the colorful season of autumn. Unfortunately, our air conditioning has been out of order in the parish administration center and rectory since early August. We've had many warm days in the office and hot nights for sleep during the past seven weeks. We've been told that the air conditioning needs to be replaced and are currently receiving Pastor's desk estimates for this to happen. In the meantime, we are all very happy for a change in weather.

Amongst other things, October is Respect Life Month. A very important teaching of our Catholic Church is that life begins at conception and continues until natural death. I'm sure you are aware of the fact that our state has recently put into place some very liberal laws regarding abortion. I've told the story many times about the beautiful premature baby who was born at only 20 weeks gestation. I had the fortune of being able to baptize her and seven years later to give her First Communion. It deeply saddens me to think that children like her are being aborted. As a society, we need to do more to help those who are expecting children to realize the many options available to them if they are not able to personally raise them. Please pray that all of life will be respected.

It is our custom during the month of October to share with information regarding the financial and overall giving reports of our parish. Dear Brothers and Sisters,

We are now in the month of October, a time in which it is inevitable to think about the end of the year that is fast approaching. Many of you perhaps already know that the name of the month of October comes from the Latin *octo*, meaning *eight*. The reason for this is that, in the Roman calendar, October was the eighth month of the year. Then, after the Julian calendar reform, January and February were added to the beginning of the calendar. So, October became the tenth month of the year as we know it today. Isn't this interesting? After all, even if many of you know this fact, it always good to remember the details.

In the month of October, our Catholic Church brings us many opportunities to praise the Lord and grow in faith, especially through prayer and meditation on the words of God. Regarding prayer and meditation, Saint Theresa of Avila—whom we remember on October 15<sup>th</sup>—once said; *"Mental prayer, in my opinion, is nothing else than an intimate sharing between friends; it means taking time frequently to be alone with Him whom we know loves us. The important thing is not to think much but to love much and so do that which best stirs you to love. Love is not great delight but desire to please God in everything." Certainly, as we strive to be better children of God, we need to spend time in prayer. Only then can we better understand the infinite Love of God, can we understand His will for us, and can we be enriched with many graces to fulfill our commitments and accomplish our plans in this last quarter of the year.* 

In addition to the opportunity to reflect on Saint Theresa of Avila, we are given the chance to reflect on Saint Luke, the Evangelist, whom we celebrate on October 18<sup>th</sup>. Traditionally, Saint Luke—known as the Gentile companion of Saint Paul—is recognized as the author of the Gospel that bears his name and the author of the book of the Acts of the Apostles. Interestingly, most of what we know about Saint Luke comes from the New Testament. Sadly, we do not know the place or date of his birth with certain. What we *do* know from the Gospel of Luke in the New Testament is that it contains numerous characteristics that, in many ways, reveal the kind of person he was and, naturally, the kind of relationship he would have had with the Lord Jesus. For example, from Luke we learn the story leading up to the conception and birth of our Lord Jesus (Luke 1-2). From Luke we find some of the most beautiful parables in the Gospels, such as the Good Samaritan and the traditionally-called Prodigal Son (or Merciful Father).

Yes, it is Saint Luke who shows us Jesus praying before every important moment of His public life. It is Luke who shows us an openness to the group of Gentiles to whom the Gospel is especially addressed. And, it is Luke who shows us women playing important roles. As proof, he places greater attention on the mother of Jesus, her cousin Elizabeth, the sisters Mary and Martha, the widow of Nain, and even the sinful woman in the house of Simon the Pharisee.

Likewise, in the Letter of Paul, we can find important information regarding this talented man named Luke. For instance, in the letter to Philemon (v.24) Paul mentions, "Luke, my fellow worker." Also, in the Letter to the Colossians (4:14) he says of Luke, "our dear physician." This reference is what led the Church to say that Luke was a medical practitioner or something related. Yet, there is a commonly-held belief that he was also a painter: one well-known icon of the Virgin Mary has been attributed to him although we cannot find reliable documents that prove this claim. Even so, Saint Luke is traditionally recognized as the patron of artists, medical professions, painters, sculptors and—oddly enough—butchers.

Therefore, as the beginning of the last quarter of the year starts, let us consider how to improve our relationship with our loving Heavenly Father through our daily prayer and devotion thereby honoring Saint Theresa of Avila. Let us invoke the intercession of Saint Luke that we may not only grow in the love of God and love for Sacred Scripture, but also that Saint Luke continues to watch over—with his special attention—the artists, medical professionals, painters, sculptors, and butchers among us.

I wish you the best throughout all your activities in this month of October, and I reiterate my thanks to all of you. As well, I can assure you of my prayers for the success of all your many projects and the well-being of your families. God bless each one of you.

October is designated as National Domestic Violence Awareness month. Exactly what IS domestic violence? According to the FaithTrust Institute (www.faithtrustinstitue.org), it is a pattern of violence and coercive behavior exercised by one adult over another in an intimate relationship. It is not "marital conflict," "a lover's quarrel," or a "private family matter." Domestic violence may consist of repeated, severe beatings or more subtle forms of abuse, including control and threats. Eighty-five percent of domestic violence victims are women, although men can suffer

abuse, as well. Domestic violence is physical assault, sexual assault, psychological assault, assaults against property and pets.

WHY DOES SHE STAY? She stays because she is terrified that he will become more violent if she leaves, that he will try to take the children, or that she can't make it on her own. She stays for any number of reasons that the abuser has convinced her are valid.

Remember: if you or someone you know are being abused, it is NOT your fault. YOU ARE NOT ALONE. Contact the Domestic Violence Hotline at 800-799-7233. If you are in immediate danger, call 911.
